LIST OF DEFINITIONS

An unfashionable or socially inept person.

Nerd – A foolish or contemptible person who lacks social skills or is boringly studious Fan –A person who has a strong interest in or admiration for a particular person or thing. Fandom (also uncommonly known as "Geekdom" or "Nerdom") – The fans of a particular person, team, fictional series, etc., regarded collectively as a community or subculture. INTRODUCTION

ON ABJECTION WITHIN NERD CULTURE

There is also a process of an individual learning to reject and hate a part of themselves due to being abjected by a collective.
